President's Report:

Toronto Rugby continues to grow in certain areas, however we are facing some challenges which include decreasing numbers in certain age groups, increasing critical mass locally so we can reduce the travel (one of the components of player attrition) and keeping cost down while trying to improve communications and services. Toronto Rugby is the 3rd largest union in the country (including provincial unions) with over 5,000 members.

The success of the fall 7's competition continues to grow (492 games this fall) and we want to increase the participation of girl's teams in this league.

In 2013, the first Provincial championship for age grade sevens occurred in London with 3 of the 4 branches participating. This was the first time in many years that the branches have had an interbranch competition. While there were challenges in getting this program off the ground, we are committed to continue this program (2014 will be a summer games year) and expand this into a 15 a side competition for junior players.

Goals for 2014:

- Increasing the number of girl's teams in the fall 7's series.
- Increase and develop the women's game in general by adjusting leagues to reduce challenges, encouraging and working with clubs to start women's teams etc.
- Working with the branch committee to insure the provincial championship competition continues to grow and expand.
- Updating the website, creating a comprehensive database and communication policy.
- Expand and improve the branch representative 7's program for both genders.

I would like to thank all the volunteers who work with TR including the board of directors, conveners, and permit officers etc. who make this union a huge success. We could not get the job done without the dedication and hard work of this group of individuals.

Game Director's Report

Summary

The Game Director was a new role for the Toronto Rugby Board. The main role of the Game Director is to represent the League Conveners at board meetings and to work with the membership to better the game of rugby in the region. Toronto Rugby had 3 returning conveners and 1 new convener for the start of the 2013.

At the beginning of the men's and women's seasons, the largest concern from our membership was field availability due to poor field conditions. Clubs adapted well by working with each other to solve these issues with alternate sites and changing their home and away matches.

The Game Regulations were reviewed throughout the season. A few key sections were updated, including score reporting fines, field enclosures (ropes) and numbers on jerseys. These updates were made due to club communication with league Conveners and the Toronto Rugby Executive.

In 2013, Toronto Rugby received many complaints and concerns with regards to the standard of refereeing. Many of these issues were due to the overall lack of numbers in the Toronto & District Rugby Referee Society. Most of our membership dealt with these issues by notifying the league of their concerns and using the proper channels for feedback.

The Senior Men's convener conducted a survey with our membership to provide feedback on the league and referee concerns.

Suggestions for 2014

- Start-of-the-Year Comments and Concerns conducted well in advance of the Fixtures Meeting
- End-of-the-Year survey for all 4 leagues
- Regional Divisions to decrease travel for Clubs
- Increase referee numbers and Club referee numbers
- Post-game feedback on referee performance

Senior Men's Convener Report

Lindsay RFC has won promotion into Rugby Ontario Marshall Provincial. If accepted the leagues will be as followed, Toronto Rugby B and C division are based off surveys sent in October.

Toronto Rugby A- Bay Street, T. Saracens, T. Nomads, Belleville Bulldogs, T. Dragons and Brock* (depending ability to field two sides in 2014) if not Mississauga Blues.

Three options for Toronto Rugby B in 2014.

- Same as 2013- Home and Away in division and 2 Home and 2 away games vs non-division = 10 games
 - a. Toronto Rugby B West- Vaughan Yeomen, North Simcoe Dingos, GB Titans, North Halton Highlanders
 - b. Toronto Rugby B East- Cobourg Saxons, Toronto Scottish III, Beach III, Mississauga Blues or Brock

If league structure is the same as 2013 the league:

- c. Toronto Rugby C- Bucs, Ajax III, Markham III, Barbs III, CRU III, Nomads III, Barrie III

- 2. Brampton Beavers decided to play for promotion to the OWL, but were unsuccessful. They will stay in the TRU. The Premier Championship winner was Markham-Irish and the B Championship winner was Barrie.
- 3. Concerns for next season include league structure:
 - a. If the league stays with Premier and B divisions, Barrie will be promoted and the Toronto Nomads will be relegated.
 - b. If the OWL goes to only a first team league structure, there may be reason to divide the TRU Women's division into East/West.
 - i. Possible rationale for East/West divisions:
 - 1. Focus needs to be on developing women's rugby as a whole (current model doesn't allow for this)
 - **2.** Travel is an issue for all players how many players are teams NOT recruiting due to travel issues?
 - Teams would cross-over for playoffs, with top teams in each division having to play for entrance to the Intermediate Cup – makes for more competition
- 4. There were issues regarding score reporting and the penalty for not reporting scores on time. We need to be consistent across the TRU so that all teams are aware of the penalty for not reporting scores and that the scores are reported consistently.

Junior Boy's Convener Report:

Thanks-you to all the coaches and athletes on very successful Toronto Rugby season in both 15-aside and 7-aside. In total we had 58 sides competing in 15-aside leagues and 36 sides in the 7-aside series.

Congratulations to all the league champions from 2013 and to the Aurora Barbarians on capturing the Rugby Ontario Championship in the boys U-18 division.

Below is a summary and suggested discussion points going forward to the 2014 season.

15-aside highlights:

- Creation of an "Inner-City" division to ease travel issues for Toronto based teams.
- Creation of a U15 division to provide appropriate competition for athletes.
- Maintained a 2-tier competition at U16 and U18.
- Expanded playoffs to include more teams.

15-aside areas for discussion:

- Requirement of minimum registered players to compete in multiple divisions within the same insurance category.
- Elimination of tiering in the U16 league to ease travel requirements.
- Review shutdown of leagues for National Championships.

7-aside highlights:

- Significant growth in all divisions from 2012.
- Fewer withdrawals by teams in 2013 than in 2012.

7-aside areas for discussion:

- Move to independent tournaments with points accumulated based on results and participation. Final tournament would award entry to top 8 teams in each age group.
- Encourage regional competitions to ease travel.
- Greater penalty for forfeits.

Thanks again for all the support given to junior rugby in the TRU. Each year we are faced with new challenges created by growth and demand for the game. I look forward to discussing these items with everyone at the 2014 pre-season meeting.

Junior Girl's Conveners Report:

This summer we had 18 U18 girls teams. We broke them into the following geographic divisions.

The match ups were pretty good for travel and most teams were very competitive. We had a few issues with low numbers and a few defaults. With the inclusion of the U16 league we were able to have the 8 U16 teams do double headers with their U18 teams in the Central and East divisions.

Although most of the teams were quite competitive, both Brampton and Peterborough were able to dominate and separate them selves from the other teams. After our semi finals (top team in each pool) the Pagans and Beavers faced each other in a very good final in which Peterborough were victorious as Toronto Rugby Champs.

All other teams that were still able to field a team at the end of August were invited to take part in Plate, Shield and Bowl finals. Most finals were held at Fletchers Fields on our Junior Cup Day.

Peterborough went on to represent Toronto at the Ontario Championships and came out victorious.

We were able to run double headers which worked well for coaches and players. Both divisions were very competitive with final playoff positions being decided on the last day of league games. We had the top two teams in each pool do a Cup semi final with the bottom two in each play a Plate semi-final.

All games were well contested with Brampton moving onto the Cup Final vs Oshawa with Barbs facing Peterborough in the Plate Final.

Oshawa defeated Brampton for the Toronto Rugby U16 Championship with Peterborough taking the Plate Championship.

THOUGHTS: (U18 and U16)

I felt that the leagues ran fairly smoothly. Geographic divisions definitely help. However, Barrie for the second year in a row ran a strong team in a division where defaults were prevalent among some of the other clubs. This is unfair to their program. We need clubs to put more effort into registering players earlier in the spring and guaranteeing numbers for our leagues. We can look at earlier confirmation dates, but I realize as a coach how hard it is to get those kids out and registered. We definitely need some solutions.

Overall though, there was some very good rugby being played in our leagues.

GIRLS FALL 7's SERIES:

This year we improved our numbers from 4 U18 teams last year to 3 U16 and 7 U18 teams.

All in all (a few default and numbers problems) I think that junior girls rugby is going very strong with many clubs doing great work to build the game in Toronto Rugby.

Technical Director's Report

Interbranch 7's, August 2013

We had 4 teams (2 male and 2 female) travel to London. There were 48 athletes in total, with 2 managers and 4 coaches. We had gold and bronze finishes for all teams.

New York 7's, 2013

12 athletes, one manager and one coach travelled to New York 7's at the end of November. The team finished 5th out of 12 teams.

TRU 7's, Fall 2013

The 7's coaches and managers used these games to identify athletes for the 2014 season. They also held open tryouts for all players. This certainly cut down on the cost of dome rentals by identifying athletes in the fall.

2014 Season

Sandy Townsend (coach), Bryan Armstrong (coach) and Khalil Ajram (manager) will be staying on for the 2014 season. Bryan and Khalil will be taking a team to the Las Vegas 7's at the end of January.

Brittany Douglas (coach) and Bethany Chekay (manager) will be looking after the girls program.

There are discussions surrounding running an interbranch program every year, including non-summer games years. Competitions may also be arranged with Ottawa, Quebec and maybe even BC.

Overall, the program has been a success. We believe identifying athletes in the fall during the TRU 7's is key. This allows for indoor training in the winter, with competitions throughout the summer. We need to continue developing 7's as move towards towards the Olympics.

Discipline Director's Report:

Summary:

Overall, the 'processes' associated with being the TRU's Director of Discipline for this past year (2013 season: re: Red Card Reports/Disciplinary Actions/Appeals/etc.) went far smoother for me this past season than the previous season; this being my second season in the role, and & another season for the refs who mostly appear to be more familiar with utilizing the whostheref system/process in reporting incidents. Although there was more volume overall this season, the process had fewer noted instances of issues (Red Card Reports not being reported/received, misdirected, late, etc).

The summary of the reports is as follows:

Red Cards - 35 Total (*Of these 24 were reported and received to me properly via whostheref) Yellow Cards - 86 Total

Total incidents reported - 120 (109 via whostheref)

Issues:

*Of the 11 noted above; 3 were received by me via email, but had not been properly/ or were unable to be saved/submitted on the system, & 4 were properly saved/submitted on the system by the ref, but we're not properly routed to me. The remainder were sorted out via hunting down the report. In these cases, the process of having a team member also contacting me, as per the proper process in the regulations, alerted me to the missing reports which were hence located, and investigated.

The above issue noted with the routing error occurred in late July/August, and was corrected. The issue involved an access issue/notification rule set on the system related to the team division.

Appeals, Hearings, etc.:

I had several teams that had requested information regarding the process to appeal/request for clarification regarding the noted infraction and subsequent imposed sanction for Disciplinary Actions imposed by me (TRU jurisdiction), but only 1 that was formally requested/followed through with the appeal process. That request was lead by Jose.

However, I did proceed with 4 Discipline by Hearing processes relating to actions for my consideration.

Lastly, I was a part of 3 Appeal Hearings involving other regions, not including others I was a panel member for regarding incidents of referee abuse.

T&DRRS Liaison's Report:

This past year has been a long transition for refereeing in Ontario. We still have many things to do, but we have put together some structure moving from the TDRRS to Rugby Ontario (Specifically the RORC---Rugby Ontario Referee Committee). The biggest change was moving a lot of the administration to Rugby Ontario. The RORC was created at the end of 2012 to lead refereeing in Ontario in many aspects of development, appointments and policy while creating a position in Rugby Ontario to handle the administrative part of Refereeing. The ORRS is not gone, but worked alongside the RORC with essentially the same members. The RORC consists of the 3 Branch presidents plus 2 members of Rugby Ontario (One ORU board member and RO Executive Director). The RORC meets to choose an outside Chairman to run this committee and sit on the ORU Board. the RORC then gets together to find people to be in charge of an appointments and development sub---committee. The TDRRS works within these committees. Over the past year the framework of these positions and structure were put in place. As the next year progresses the RORC will develop more policies to outline refereeing in Ontario. The TDRRS is the largest area for refereeing in Ontario. We still have a lot of responsibility in helping to develop referees in Ontario. Over the past year development and appointments dominated our time. We have over 100 members from the TDRRS area including graded referees, directors, club referees, and coaches. WTR is still the main avenue for appointments, registration, coaching reports and general communication. The TDRRS Appointments Officer had well over 1000 appointments to do last year. The RORC Appointments committee will better coordinate games across this province to help alleviate some of the headaches by implementing best referee for best game. From a development perspective the TDRRS had 7 clinics, over eight workshops/fitness sessions to run. Some of the workshops were TDRRS specific, however a few were coordinated with the RORC and included members of the NRRS. As well, our referee coaches produced 37 coaching reports for our members this year. With a referee coach clinic on the books for this spring, we are hoping to get that number up for next year, however we anticipate difficulty in filling the large shoes left by our late friend and mentor, Brian Chaitland. Some of the Admin work was handled by RO to help alleviate the workload. As time goes on, most of the Admin work will be done by RO. Financially, most of the money is now being handled by RO, however the money currently in the TDRRS accounts remains as a Legacy Fund

for our internal use (kit subsidies, social events, etc).
